



REPORT FROM IRAN: US-Israeli Attacks Destroy Spaces for Youth

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Dimitri Lascaris (DL): This is Dimitri Lascaris coming to you for Reason2Resist on March 21st, 2026 from Tehran in Iran. This is what remains of a sports complex and football stadium in central Tehran. Of course, this was destroyed in an airstrike by the Epstein regime, whether it was the US wing or the Israeli wing of the Epstein regime, who knows? And for what demented reason did they destroy this facility? Well, I guess you'll have to put that question to the Epstein regime.

Alireza Akbari (AA): In the name of God, this is the Panahi complex in Tehran. This is a sports complex. Its name is Panahi. It is one of the oldest complexes in Tehran. Here we just do the cultural and sport activities. Many of the young people and teenagers come here who are interested in sports and cultural activities. You can see that 100% of this complex is now out of service and has turned into rubble. Different parts of this complex, such as this football field, the wrestling complex over there – yeah, that one was a wrestling complex. And here is the football headquarters of South Eastern Tehran. Nothing is left after the bombardment. There were three missiles that hit this location. The first one hit that wrestling complex. The second one hit this building. The headquarters of football for Azadi in Tehran. And the third one? And the 3rd one hit this building, a multifunctional building, a sports building. Some thousands of people, very active young people, were coming here to do sports. It took place on Tuesday, 26th of Esfand in our Persian calendar. And there was no one here at the time of attack. No one, we evacuated some days before that attack. Unfortunately, two people were killed in this residential area, two were killed, they were martyred, and five people injured. Two killed, five injured. He says that it was hit with three cruise missiles and here we have the remnants of those missiles. Yeah, let's go see.

Do you want to see? And even the other building, Dimitri, has also been impacted in the back. Do you see the glass? He says that he was doing the sport here. Do you want to check this out? His name is Hamed Taji, Iranian teenager. Hamed, how old are you? He is 12 years old. Hamed, have you ever been here before? He says yes. What were you doing here? "We were playing football here," he said.

I asked him, "Why do you think they have targeted here?", he says "I don't know". What sport do you do here? Football? What about you guys? He says that they are living somewhere near this location. Thank you, Hamed. Now, where do you think you want to go and play? He says that after this place was destroyed they have no other place. "We are just sitting at home". This is the multi-functional complex. They were active in both men and women's sports in different sports such as cycling, volleyball or football. [Inaudible]. Watch your head, please.

DL: Is it the remains of a cruise missile in that pit?

AA: He says that one missile did not explode. But the military officials came and they did it. There is no danger right now but below those stones you can find the remnants of a missile.

DL: Does he have any handy that we can take a close look at?

AA: He says "I can go but it is dangerous, I may fall down".

DL: I'll go.

AA: He says below there is a spring, there is water.

DL: Oh, there's water under there? So the ground is unstable?

AA: He says "I have kept a particle of a missile.

DL: Oh okay, let me have a look at it.

AA: Yeah, I asked him.

Ahmed: This is the impact site. I don't know if you can really tell or not, but it goes deep.

DL: What do you think, Ahmed? This looks like a military facility to me.

Ahmed: Yeah, this is actually where the ballistic missiles are armed with nuclear warheads.

DL: I mean, there's evidence everywhere of military activity here.

Ahmed: So the judo they would do here was actually a cover. Really, what they were doing was enriching uranium to about 95%. And then they would have the other kids mounted onto the ballistic missile, hide it underneath the turf, and then launch them.

DL: We solved the crime. See over there more buildings damaged from the strike.

Ahmed: Thank you so much for liberating Iran. My goodness, look what you've done to the place. It's so much better already. How wonderful. Thank you. Thank you, President.

DL: That looks like a mighty nasty piece of shrapnel.

Ahmed: So this is the twisted metal. What he says in the leftover piece of the bomb. Is there anything else? Is there more? Just this?

DL: You can see on this wall a painting of boxers. Rapid renovation, thanks to the Epstein regime.
